# Preparing the ground

Over the next four years, Deutsche will provide 33 grassroots community sports clubs in London with grants, training and management support to run education activities alongside their core sports offering.

We're currently working with five clubs on the pilot phase of the programme, which will run until November 2013. the goal of the pilot is to develop a model all clubs can use to support the educational needs of their young people.

### Who's involved?

The clubs involved in the pilot phase are Carney's Community in Lambeth, Crown and Manor Club in Hoxton, St Matthew's Project in Brixton, track academy in Brent and White Star Youth association in Tottenham.

These clubs are run by hugely passionate and committed volunteers who know their local communities and the issues these young people face – low-income backgrounds, difficult home lives, few positive role models – better than anyone.

Getting their input is crucial to the success of *sporteducate*. We're looking forward to working together and we'll be profiling some of the organisers, coaches and mentors from our *sporteducate* partners in the months ahead.

### Step by step

This month, clubs are attending training workshops on how to use the *sporteducate* toolkit and educational resources we've developed. During September and October, they'll put these ideas into practice by running new or additional educationbased activities alongside their existing sports programmes.

The pilot will also be used to develop a framework for measurement and evaluation that gives a true picture of *sporteducate*'s impact.

We think *sporteducate* has huge potential. Proof of impact will give this idea the credibility it needs to grow. In time, we'd like to take *sporteducate* beyond london and bring other social investors on board.
